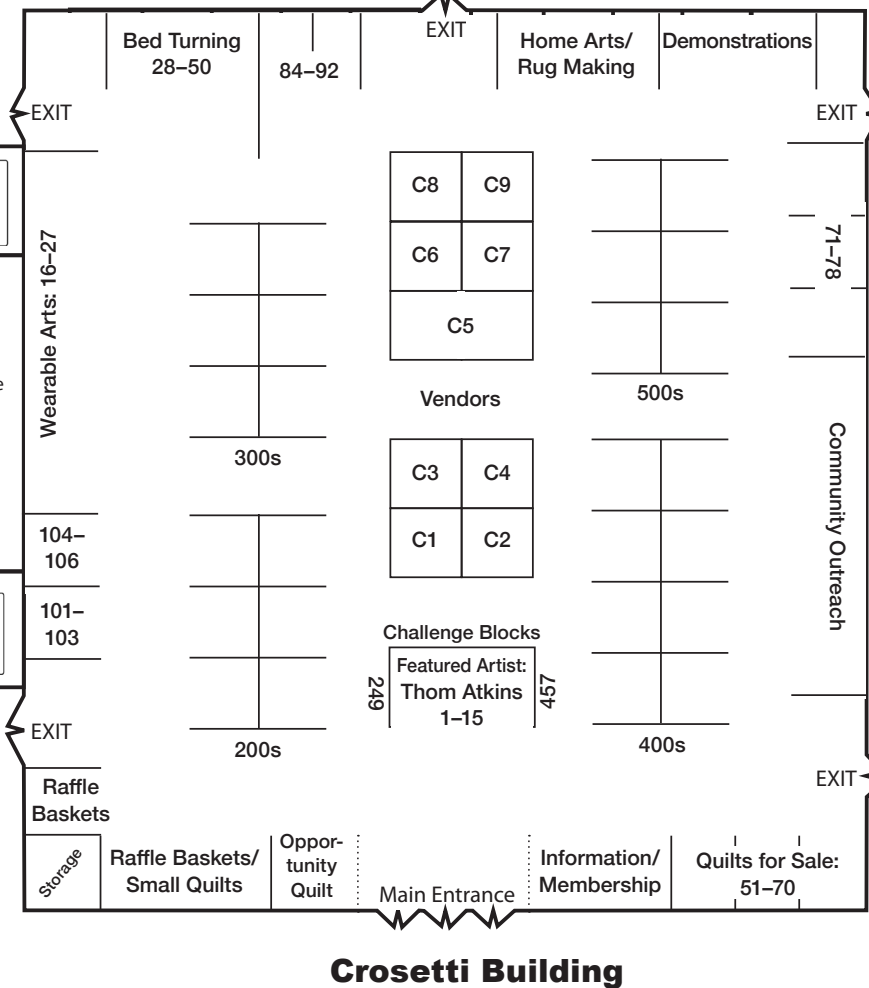
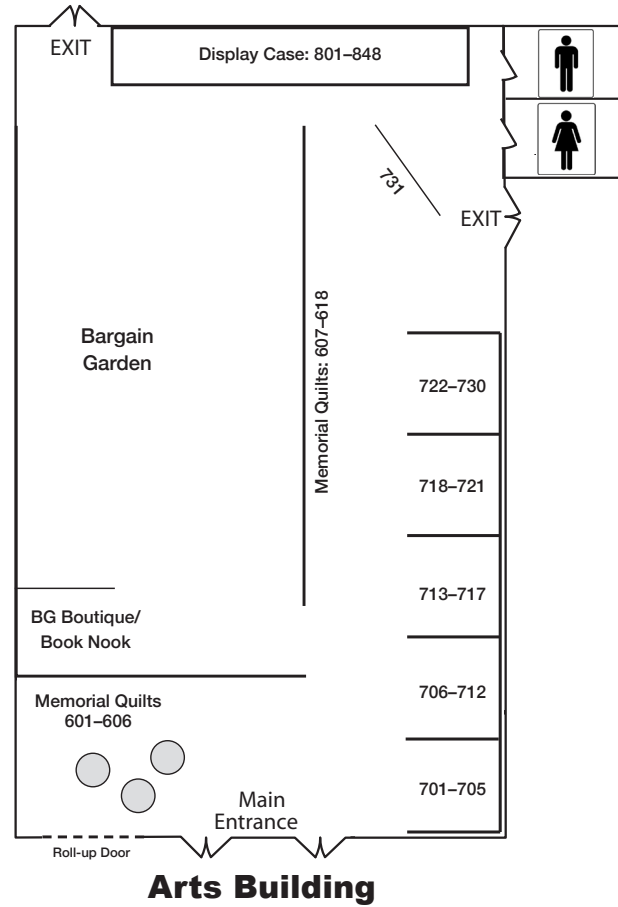
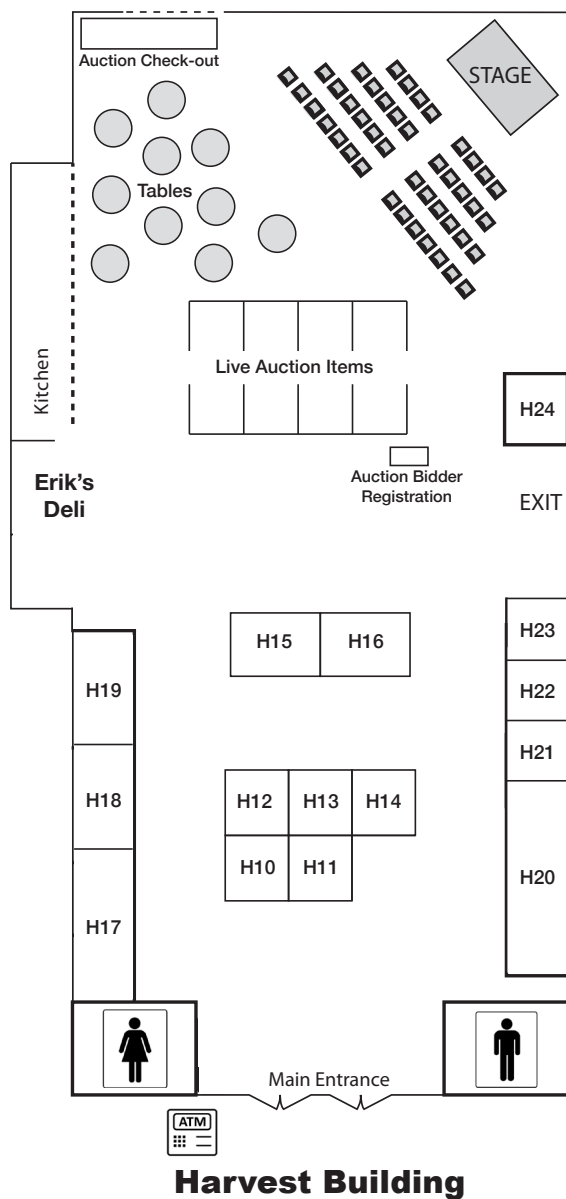


Quilt Show Policies

Featured Artist/Speaker: Thom Atkins Saturday 2pm — Harvest Bldg.

His grandmother taught Thom to sew on a treadle sewing machine at age four. At San Jose State he majored in Interior Decorating, and took classes in painting, life drawing, and ceramics. After college, he joined the Navy and taught oil painting while stationed in Japan.



Next, Thom settled in Seattle where he did graduate work at an art institute and managed a craft gallery. There he was introduced to beads, and started his own business as a landscape designer. This experience contributed to his passion for color, texture, and form on a grand scale. Eventually, Thom and his wife settled in Santa Cruz in a home with a studio where he worked in clay sculpture, then bronze, silversmithing, and forging. When a bronze sculpture was knocked over and broken, he decided to move to a non-fragile media... Beads first, then beaded quilts, then, finally, award-winning art quilts that are a synthesis of his expertise in a wide variety of media.

In Memoriam

Mickey Beebe, a longtime PVQA member, was also active in the modern quilt movement. She received her latest national award-winning recognition for her “Eichler Houses” quilt at QuiltCon in 2016. **Freddy Moran**, an internationally recognized artist, author, and teacher, was known best for her sense of humor and color. She is famous for her phrase, “Red is a neutral!” **Christine Sodt** was a loving and sharing teacher. Sure, she loved making quilts and garments, but mixing dye colors, dying different fabrics in various ways, and discharging fabrics were just a few things she shared with us—opening a whole new world of making your own fabric. Another longtime member, **Lisa Ellis**, was an avid hand-quilter who loved scouring antique stores for vintage fabrics to use in her quilts.
